How does the reception staff deal with pupils?		
How do pupils behave towards each other?

Do pupils stick to the rules about uniform and jewellery etc?	
Research shows that a good environment can raise a pupil's self-esteem. Do pupils/staff seem to have pride in their school?	
Do staff have time to talk and have they been properly briefed?	
How do staff speak about pupils with SEN?	
Does the school have a physical environment that would suit your child?	
Are pupils of all abilities represented in the work displayed around the school?	
How many pupils in class groups?	
How does the school introduce new pupils to the school?	
Who would my son daughter talk to if they had a problem?	
Where do pupils spend their breaks and lunch times?	

What examinations can the school offer?	
What proportion of the children in the school have special needs?	
These are my child's needs, do you have staff with specialist qualifications/experience?	
Could you outline the support he/she will get?	
Is this just in their current year or throughout the school?	
How are Individual Education Plans (IEPs) monitored?	
How will subject staff know about my child's needs?	
How will they be helped to support my child?	
Does the school have a buddy system?	
How does the school communicate with parents?	

When will you keep me informed of my child's progress?	
Things the school might ask you for	
A copy of your child's statement, if any, or details of his or her needs.
